



20th CORE COURSE OF SAFIR: REGULATORY EXPERIENCE IN INFRASTRUCTURE SECTORS

(February 21 - 23, 2022)

The Indian Institute of Management Ahmedabad (IIMA), India's premier management institute, was approached by Gujarat Electricity Regulatory Commission (GERC) on behalf of the Central Electricity Regulatory Commission (CERC) for the conduct of a short programme for the South Asia Forum for Infrastructure Regulation (SAFIR). The programme was to be in line with what IIMA had done in terms of past programme for the sector as well as for the regulators, including the Orientation Programme for the Electricity Regulators (conducted by IIMA to expose the Chairperson's and Members of electricity regulatory commissions on the theory and practice of regulations in India and share awareness of the global best practices).

The programme, attended by a total of 13 participants (the list of participants has been reproduced in Exhibit I in the report), comprised of a ten-session online programme to be undertaken by IIMA and IIMA selected guest faculty/experts (February 21 - 23, 2022)





ABOUT THE PROGRAMME AND PROGRAMME OBJECTIVES

IIMA has been designing and conducting customised executive programmes for governments (including foreign), large public sector undertakings, large and small private corporates both domestic and international, multilateral agencies, parastatals like regulatory bodies, on a wide variety of topics besides the functional areas of management. Such programmes constitute a significant part of its activities. Some of the notable programmes designed and delivered by the IIMA faculty for the Power Sector are as below:

- IIMA has designed and delivered the 18th Core Course for the SAFIR participants in January 2020. The programme undertaken was a 3 day classroom programme and participants also were taken for field visits to EMC SCADA Center established by the Uttar Gujarat Vij Company Limited (UGVCL) in Gandhinagar, Sardar Sarovar Project (SSP) and a cultural visit to the Statue of Unity at Kevadia, Gujarat
- IIMA has designed and delivered the programme for NHPC in March 2019 on Power Regulations and Economics. This was undertaken as a 5 classroom day programme on campus.
- Several regulators programme for the Chairpersons, Members and Directors of the State Electricity Regulatory Commissions. This was in two modules. Module I was the domestic component undertaken at IIMA while Module II was with an international partner university.
- Several programmes for various electricity companies in Punjab, Rajasthan, MP and Gujarat for senior managers on the topics of leadership for change in the context of reform
- Several programmes for GETRI and GUVNL were designed and delivered on leadership and change management






- IIMA has also designed and delivered programmes for Power Market Leadership in collaboration with the Power Exchange India Limited (PXIL). The main objective of the programmes offered was to jointly develop, arrange and offer various Training and Capacity Building programmes related to the power sector and to train the officers from the various utility companies on electricity trading.
- IIMA is handholding NSB for design and delivery of the PGDM(e) programme which includes twelve months of classroom teaching and three months of project work. A significant part of the curriculum is delivered by professors from IIMA. The PGDM(E) programme has been designed for working professionals to add value to their career and prepare visionary leaders for energy sector and the first batch of the programme would be graduating soon

Given IIMA's vast experience in the sector, the research expertise and the deep knowledge of the sector by the faculty, besides the fact that IIMA has also conducted the Core Courses for SAFIR including the last programme (which was highly appreciated by the participants), the programme was awarded to IIMA. During the Training Needs Analysis (TNA) by the IIMA programme chair Prof Ajay Pandey with SAFIR officials, GERC and a sample size of participants it was felt that the that the sessions would need to be highly interactive with a focus on sharing the concepts along with possible challenges with the participants. This would enable the participants with knowledge of putting the concepts in practice. Basis the TNA it was suggested that the programme being an online one, the sessions would have to be spaced out and the sessions would need to be curated for the programme module. The focus of the programme was on policy and regulatory challenges in Power, Transportation, Electricity, Telecom and Urban issues



CURATION AN DESIGN PROCESS FOR THE PROGRAMME CUSTOMISATION





Prof Ajay Pandey
Fellow (IIM, Ahmedabad), BE (Roorkee)
Faculty Chair for the Programme

Prof. Ajay Pandey is currently on the IIMA Board of Governors as the Chairman's Nominee. He has been Chair and Professor of Finance & Accounting area at Indian Institute of Management, Ahmedabad. He has also served as Chairperson of the task force on the proposed School of Public Policy at IIMA, Prof Pandey has over 25 years' experience in teaching, training and consultancy. He has served as Dean (Programmes) from 2013-15, Dean (Faculty) from 2010-13. In these roles, he has been part of several committees and initiatives within the institute to review programs, activities and processes from the perspective of change management. He also played the role of Director-in-charge of IIM Ahmedabad for a short period in 2013. His other administrative roles at IIMA include being Chair of the Admissions Committee, Chair of the IIMA's flagship two-year MBA programme - Post Graduate Programme in Management (PGP), Chair of the Financial Aid Committee and Chair, Finance and Accounting Area. He also serves as a Member of Board for the Center for Innovation, Incubation and Entrepreneurship (CIIE) at IIM Ahmedabad and as an independent director on the boards of Bharat Dynamics Limited and Uttar Gujarat Vij Company Limited. Before joining IIMA, he was associated with Management Development Institute (MDI), Gurgaon, Administrative Staff College of India (ASCI), Hyderabad and IIM Lucknow. He started his career as project planning and monitoring engineerin Engineers India Limited (EIL) and Oil & Natural Gas Corporation (ONGC) and laterin a private sector firm. He received a doctorate at IIMA Ahmedabad by specializing in Finance and is an engineering graduate from University of Roorkee (now an IIT).





His professional interest related to research, teaching and training are mainly in corporate finance and capital markets such as corporate governance, risk management, project finance, volatility, commodity markets, regulation, and asset price dynamics. He has published papers in national and international journals in these areas. Outside financial economics and corporate finance, his interests include electricity tariff regulations, sectoral reforms, public procurement and public policy issues in the context of infrastructure sectors. He has published or written cases on issues related to land markets, natural resource allocation, public procurement, risk allocation in PPPs and regulatory disputes. He contributed to the India Infrastructure Reports and was one of the editors for the 2008 & 2009 India Infrastructure Reports. He has beeninvolved in studying and reviewing the electricity sector reforms as it has evolved. He has consulted for governments, corporates, parastatal, and regulators.

He has been actively involved in teaching a wide variety of courses offered by IIMA. He was involved in design and development of three courses at IIM Ahmedabad. Two of these were specifically for the participants specializing in the public management and policy programme. These courses were- (a) Developments in the Electricity Sector, and (b) Real Estate. The third course- Philosophical Foundation of Management; is an elective meant for the two-year MBA students and continues to be offered by IIMA. Engaging with the practitioners in the government, he has coordinated several executive education programs customized for senior most civil servants of different cadres such as IAS, IPS, IRS etc. These programs were designed to cover cadre-specific issues and challenges. He has also coordinated and taught practitioners in several executive education programs on finance and infrastructure sectors.







Prof Anish Sugathan Fellow (IIM, Bangalore)

Dr. Anish Sugathan is Faculty at the Business Policy Area of the Indian Institute of Management Ahmedabad, a Research Affiliate at the International Growth Center at the London School of Economics and Political Science, and previously an Associate at the Harvard Kennedy School's Center for Business and Government. He serves on the board of Uttar Gujarat Vij Company Ltd., the governing board of the IIMA-JSW School of Public Policy, and also advises several start-ups in the clean-tech and smart governance space.

His research interests are in the in the area of institutional and governance infrastructure of emerging economies that fosters sustainable development of private and public stakeholders. He holds an undergraduate degree in Engineering from the University of Kerala and is a Fellow of the Indian Institute of Management Bangalore. He was the SAP Labs India doctoral scholar at IIM-B, and the Giorgio Ruffolo post- doctoral fellow at the Harvard Kennedy School of Government.

His research has been published in reputed international journals like EnergyPolicy, Journal of International Business Studies, Rutgers Business Review, Economics and Political Weekly, and many national and international dailies. He teaches 'Strategic Management', 'Business, Environment, and Sustainability', and 'Government Systems and Processes' courses at IIMA.







Prof G Raghuram
PhD (Northwestern University, USA)

Raghuram is a Distinguished Visiting Faculty and Principal Academic Advisor of the National Rail and Transportation Institute of the Ministry of Railways. He has been Director, IIM Bangalore, from February 2017 to July 2020. Prior to that, he was Professor and Chairperson of the Public Systems Group at IIMA. He has been Dean (Faculty), IIMA, Vice-Chancellor of the Indian Maritime University and Indian Railways Chair Professor at IIMA.

He specializes in infrastructure and transport systems, and logistics and supply chain management. He conducts research on the railway, port, shipping, aviation and road sectors. He has been part of various government policy making and advisory committees.

Raghuram has a BTech from IIT, Madras; a Post Graduate Diploma in Management from IIM Ahmedabad; and a PhD from Northwestern University, USA.







Prof Rekha Jain PhD (IIT, Delhi)

Rekha Jain was faculty and the Executive Chair of the IIMA-IDEA Telecom Centre of Excellence, Indian Institute of Management, Ahmedabad until December 2019. She has consulted with several national and international organizations in the area of Telecom Policy and ICT Strategy. 

Prof Sebastian Morris Fellow (IIM, Calcutta); MSc (Int.) (Phys.), IIT, Bombay

Currently the Senior Professor, Goa Institute of Management (after superannuating from IIMA).

Prof Morris has been Professor. Member of the Economics, and Public Systems Areas in IIMA. His interests include international trade and investment, industrial development, macroeconomics, economic history, public sector, infrastructure, small firms, electricity reforms, regulation, PPPs, land markets, and the Indian economy. He was the recipient of the Ford Foundation Post-Doctoral Fellowship in International Economics. Won the EXIM Bank's International Trade Research Award.

He has earlier worked as Associate Professor at Institute of Public Enterprise, Hyderabad, and Senior Correspondent for Business India (magazine), visiting fellow at University of Pennsylvania, and ICCR Chair Professor at Copenhagen Business School (Asia Research Centre). Was co-chair of the IIMA-Harvard Kennedy School Phase V programmes for senior government officials. Founding Chair of the PGP-PMP of IIMA, and the Centre for Infrastructure Policy and Regulation at IIMA. Has been the editor of the India Infrastructure Reports 2001, 2002, 2003 and 2004, covering thethemes Market Structure and Regulation, Governance Issues for Commercialization, Public Expenditure Allocation and Accountability, and Ensuring Value for Money. Other books include the Growth and Transformation of Small Firms in India.





He has led several team research efforts. Has been member of several expert committees of the Government of India, and state governments. Has also consulted for international and national organisations besides government and served on several expert committees of the government of India. He is currently a member of the boardof governors GETCO, IITCOE and People Can Services Ltd.
